

#### **2 DIALOGUE TYPES**

- 1. Generally speaking, the dialogue exam questions can be divided into 4 types.
- 2. **Types 1 & 2** are the most common and the easiest. **Types 3 & 4** are the least common and the most difficult.
- 3. The dialogue situations can be either **formal or informal**.
- 4. **Practise & develop models** for the 4 types of dialogues.
